As I write this we are preparing to reopen St Mary's church for private prayer. It has been shut since the middle of March due to the Coronavirus pandemic. So it is not a simple matter of opening the doors again; there is much preparation for the building to be ready for visitors. First we have had to check that everything is in order from a health and safety perspective. Then the building has been thoroughly cleaned and aired. When you go into church you will see that it looks different inside due to the regulations around social distancing. Chairs are set apart from one another to enable people to sit without being in close proximity. All the books and children's toys have been removed. To enable cleaning, which will have to be done more frequently, part of the church is out of bounds. Also it will be open twice a week instead of daily. The opening hours are Wednesday 10am to 4pm and Sunday 11am to 4pm. Worship will continue to be accessed online through the church website https://www. stmaryseatonbray.org.uk or via the St Mary's Facebook page and on our YouTube channel. This reminds us that churches are more than buildings; the church is also a community of Christians who worship and pray and live out their faith in a particular place. But buildings are important as a visual reminder of the presence of God in our midst. They are a focal point for the community.

Despite the changes in the layout of the interior of St Mary's, those who have been into the church to get it ready for reopening have remarked on the sense of peace and calm within. Perhaps because a lot of the chairs have been moved and the books taken out the eye is focused on the stained glass windows, the beautiful reredos behind the altar and beauty of the building itself. Many people find that the church building is an important sacred space in which to come and take time out, pray or just to be still. It will now be possible to do that again and for individuals to use the building for private prayers.

St Mary's church usually hosts social events such as coffee mornings and Music at St Mary's. Sadly none of these can go ahead at the moment. We do however have a virtual coffee morning on the first Saturday in the month held on zoom. If you would like an invitation, please get in touch via the website. And there will be St Mary's Scarecrow Festival on the weekend of 3-5 July. Again, there is information on the website. We hope you will join in the fun and help raise funds for St Mary's and Dunstable Food Bank.

We are delighted that you will be able to visit the church again and hope you will find solace in being there. The following prayer is used regularly in our online worship and asks for God's presence in the midst of these difficult and challenging times.

A prayer for the coronavirus outbreak

Keep us, good Lord,

under the shadow of your mercy

in this time of uncertainty and distress.

Sustain and support the anxious and fearful, and lift up all who are brought low; that we may rejoice in your comfort knowing that nothing can separate us from your love in Christ Jesus our Lord. Amen. With every blessing,



From Farm Lad to Inspector

Retirement of Inspector Harlow

Thomas Octavius Harlow
Appointed P.c. 71 on 19th January 1882
Retired 15th June 1914

(Leighton Division Bedfordshire Constabulary).

On June 15th (1914) Inspector Thomas O. Harlow retires from active service in the Beds. Constabulary. For the last five years he has been stationed at Woburn. He was born at Ravensden, 53 years ago, was one of the nine sons of Isaac Harlow, farm bailiff on Mr Sutherland's farm, and had one sister. His father was a strict disciplinarian, and until Inspector Harlow was 19 he followed agricultural work under him, and even now he can swing a scythe, hedge, ditch, thatch or do anything else connected with farm life.

At 19 he entered the Loco Department of the Midland Railway at Wellingborough and remained there for two years. When he was 21 he joined the Beds. Police Force at Bedford in the January (19th) of 1882. (His service record shows that he was posted to Luton 19th January 1882). Three other brothers also took to police service - 2 in the Beds. and one in the Manchester City Police, and Sergt. Harlow who retired 3 years ago and is now connected with the Beds. Egg and Game Preservation Society, is one of them, the others also having now retired.

His first station was at Upper Houghton Regis and there he remained 12 months. Passing on to Sharnbrook for 4 years, he was drafted to Toddington, and after 12 or 18 months, to Eversholt for 10 months, then to Ridgemont for 4 years, and went to **Eaton Bray** where nearly five years

were spent amid much trouble and excitement. Of this, however, more anon. From there he went to Hockliffe and after 2 years he was promoted to Sergeant, and transferred to Kensworth in the Luton Division. Later he returned to Toddington and after 4 years went to Leighton Buzzard for 2 years and, being promoted Inspector in 1905, he was removed to Biggleswade and $3\frac{1}{2}$ years later transferred to Woburn. After 5 years there he is now retiring, having completed 32 years' service or 5 more than was necessary to entitle him to seek the rest he thoroughly deserves.

He has served under two Chief Constables - the late Col. Josselyn, and Major F.A.D. Stevens - and six Superintendents; Tydman, Carruthers, Shepherd, Anniwell, Baldwin and Woods.

He holds what few, if any, other members of the Force can show, a certificate of the National Health Society, 53, Berners Street W., stating that "Thos. O. Harlow has attended the Elementary Course of Lectures on First Aid at Toddington, Beds., and has successfully passed a viva voce (by word of mouth) examination therein." It is dated December 12th, 1901 and is signed by M Dunbar, Examiner. He also possesses the white metal badge of the St. John Ambulance Society, a certificate gained in May 1896, at the Bedford Centre, and the Medallions of the Society, from 1905 to 1913, consecutively, of which he has made an artistic watch chain. In all he has passed twelve examinations in First Aid. He is an excellent writer and his office work has been exceptionally good.

In carrying out his varied duties he has had one maxim. "if you want good behaviour you must set an example - instil the instruction by your example as well as by your precept," and his one endeavour in every place has been to leave it better than he found it. It is not always easy to accomplish this, but the result of his work speaks for itself.

Eaton Bray was his worst task. When he went there it was going into the wilds - the conditions were, to use a mild term, barbarous.

One of his first cases was one of drink and assault and the evidence showed that, but for his presence of mind, P.c. Harlow as he then was, would have been slipped into the pond and probably killed while trying to stop the fighting going on.

On another occasion when dealing with a disorderly couple, 20 or 30 assembled and abetted assaults on the constable, while from the following remarks from the Chairman of the Bench in the subsequent police proceedings an idea of some of the conditions can be formed. The Chairman said:

"The defendants were two of the worst characters that could be found at large in any parish in England. The list of their offences was unequalled at the Leighton Bench. Finding that a new policeman was stationed in the village – and it took a brave man to wear the Queen's uniform in Eaton Bray – surrounded by roughs and scoundrels, these two vagabonds of the first water, had plotted together to injure him. The constable cautioned them, and requested them to go home, and led ------ down the road. His companion endeavoured to carry out the plan they had formed, and called for a stick and a pickaxe, interfered with the policeman while on duty. And aided and abetted by some 20 to 30 people, some of the worst scum of Eaton Bray – and it could be imagined what the scum of Eaton Bray was like – from that den of iniquity, Bedford Square, it was only a mercy the policeman was present and able to give evidence."

On another occasion the defendant was proved to have bitten his (Mr Harlow's) wrist and thumb, bolted with the handcuffs on, and on being caught again, to have bitten and kicked him, while out of a hundred or so assembled, only one would go to help the constable. Several culprits were involved in a series of charges and the Chairman of the Bench on this occasion expressed surprise

that a man could be got to go to Eaton Bray as a police constable without assistance and gave it as his opinion that the best plan would be to establish a lock-up, and station two constables there. It was at Eaton Bray also he had another experience before which many would have quailed. A certain man, a butcher became "mad drunk." At first at the constable's request he went home to bed but got up in his shirt and went onto the shop, "wanting a knife," to make someone "sit up." P.c. Harlow went in and was met with a blow from a saw, which happily missed his head, but gashed his arm. He had to leave to get the wound dressed and tied up. On coming back, he saw the man running about the road with a 16 in. knife, and realising the danger shouted to him, "drop that knife, or I'll drop you." It had the desired effect and at the Police Court it was pointed out that but for the constable's plucky act, murder would most probably have been done. For this he was publicly presented with a "Merit Badge," and his conduct highly and eulogised, by the Chairman of the Bench (Mr. A. M. Macnamara), saying "it was a badge every constable should be proud to wear, and it was a distinction he felt sure Harlow had thoroughly earned. He had known him personally for some time and he did not believe there was a better servant in the whole force than P.c. Harlow. He was cool and collected in face of danger, and men were only really brave when in such a position they were cool and collected."

These were the sort of conditions he found at **Eaton Bray**, and during his time there he was heartily assisted by the then Vicar, the Rev. Sutton – the best friend he ever had – and the Schoolmaster (Mr. A. Richardson), and at political meetings they were the only three who could get any semblance of continued order. When he was leaving, the inhabitants expressed their regret at his going and the great improvement in the district must be attributed largely to the five years Mr. Harlow spent there.

At other places and times, high commendation had come to him, at Biggleswade in many larceny cases, at Leighton time after time, and also since he has been at Woburn. The usual run of "captures" naturally came his way. On one occasion at Toddington he found a deserter in bed, whom no one else had been able to locate, but his find made the constables dress him before he would move out. On another, while at Leighton, he had a woman and a 13 months' old baby to take to Northampton Gaol. The baby was refused admission and was handed back to him. He had to journey back to Leighton Workhouse with it and, being young and then rather "bashful," it was a most trying journey, but the baby slept all the way.

Those who know him well recognise in his maxim given above the very essence of his dealings. He has never faltered in doing his duty, but kindness and common sense have always been seen in his sternest actions, and wherever he has been he has left many friends and, to his knowledge, no enemies.

The shortest case in his record was at Woburn in 1912. He apprehended a hawker without a licence. A magistrate was passing. They went into the Magistrate's Clerk's office, the case was heard, and the man fined £1, all in 7 minutes from arrest to fine – a record surely.

His connection with police service will not be entirely severed. He has a stalwart son, 6 ft. 3 in. in height and 25 years old, in the Northampton County Borough Force. Of his family of 5, only two others remain, but his wife will accompany him in his retirement, and they will live at Ampthill, for many years we trust, and have the best of health and happiness in their well-earned repose.

Foot note: Thomas Octavius Harlow died 15th December 1942.

Gloucester Echo August 25th, 1947: Thomas' wife, Eleanor Mary Harlow, died aged 86 years on Saturday, August 23rd, 1947, at 43 Beechurst Avenue, Gloucestershire).



Black Squirrels the Result of 'Interbreeding' Grey Squirrels, Study Finds

Black squirrels are the result of "interbreeding" between their grey cousins and the North American fox squirrel, a study has concluded.

Research published in **BMC** Evolutionary Biology found the black fur emerged from a faulty pigment gene.

The study by Anglia Ruskin University (ARU) in Cambridge say the difference between black and grey squirrels is simply the colour of their fur.

Author Dr Helen McRobie said grey and fox squirrels share the "same root".

There are thought to be around 25,000 black squirrels in the UK, with numbers largely concentrated in Bedfordshire, Hertfordshire and Cambridgeshire.

The first wild black squirrel was recorded in Woburn in 1912, and was believed to have escaped from a private zoo having been imported from the United States.

The new findings build on **earlier work by Dr McRobie** which found that the black fur in grey squirrels is caused by a missing piece of DNA in its pigment gene.

Squirrels take part in "mating chases" and a male black fox squirrel "most likely" mated with a female grey, Dr McRobie said.

Dr McRobie, a senior lecturer in biomedical science, collaborated with researchers from the University of Cambridge and the Virginia Museum of Natural History in the United States.

She said people have mixed feelings about black squirrels with some regarding them as a "menace". "The most likely explanation for the black version of the gene being found

in the grey squirrel is that a male black fox squirrel mated with a female grey squirrel," she said. "The fact black grey squirrels have become so common right across North America is possibly because black fur offers a thermal advantage, helping them inhabit regions with extremely cold winters.

"This may have contributed to the expansion of the grey squirrel's range during the past 11,000 years, following the end of the most recent ice age, helping them spread further north into Canada."

The Hidden Wonders of England's Most 'Boring' County

When holiday-hungry Britons get permission for staycations, many will make a beeline for the coast. Beautiful Cornwall, Cumbria, the Isle of Wight – all besieged! Well, no thanks. Crowds aren't for everyone, especially now. Now is the time to seek out lesser-lauded spots, where you can happily keep your social distance. Now is the time to hail the unsexy interiors.

Unsexiest of all? Bedfordshire. A 2018 YouGov poll of 42,000 people found this small tract of eastern England to be the least popular of the 47 counties. Disparagers say it's too flat and boring; lacking poster-able landmarks; not London enough; too much Luton. A county people hurry through, thanks to its big, fat trunk roads and mainline rail. There seems to be limited affection for – or knowledge of – its hills and ridges, its market towns and zoological prowess (ZSL Whipsnade and Woburn Safari Park are both here), its Great Ouse and greater Bunyan.

"One reason for Bedfordshire's low score is the fact that it doesn't exist," believes Sarah Mortimer, Chair of Experience Bedfordshire. Though a ceremonial county, Bedfordshire was split into three unitary authorities in 2009: Bedfordshire Borough, Central Bedfordshire and Luton Borough. "This means you can't find a cohesive area," she claims. So, lacking a truly resonant symbol to rally behind – Bedford suspension bridge? The pasty-like Bedfordshire clanger? – the county-formerly-known-as-Bedfordshire is experiencing something of an identity crisis.

The (short) Bedfordshire chapter in my mid-century edition of Lovely Britain puts it thus: "Though there is little to excite the imagination into flights of ecstasy, there is always something in the changing scene to make one wish for a more intimate knowledge of the fields, the hedgerows and the streams." In short, it's a quiet place suited to Covid-19 times.

The byline of the Bedfordshire Area Ramblers nods to this, bidding walkers welcome to "our surprising little county". Barry Ingram, organiser of the annual Bedfordshire

Walking Festival (due to be held in September) moved to the county in 1962 and was initially unimpressed. "But as I explored I realised how varied and interesting it was," he says. "It's a great county for walks: many miles of public rights of way, generally well maintained; lovely villages; hills in the south; open spaces and wolds-like terrain in the north; the wooded centre."

Indeed, there's fine rambling all around, from Bedford's Victorian embankment to the chalk escarpment of Dunstable Downs and the Sharpenhoe Clappers; the Greensand Ridge Path goes east-west right across the county's middle. "But if I wanted to walk for hours and probably not see anyone, I would head into the north, between the A6 and A1," adds Ingram. "Or, for a long-distance hike, I'd follow the Bunyan Trail."

The name refers to puritan evangelist John Bunyan who was born in Elstow, just outside Bedford, in 1628, and imprisoned in Bedford jail for 12 years, where he penned Pilgrim's Progress. "For over 300 years, that book was only out-sold by the Bible," says Clive Arnold, Chair of the Bunyan Round Table Group. "We've been working to get Bedford branded as the home of John Bunyan in the same way that Stratford-upon-Avon is with that other writer chap." Just before lockdown, Bedford Borough Council finally added 'John Bunyan Country' panels to signs leading into the town.

Arnold, also curator of the Moot Hall Museum in Elstow, is a Bedfordian through and through. "I'm proud such a tiny county has such a rich history. Bedfordshire has never been good at selling itself, thus people think it lacks defining characteristics. But that isn't true. This is where the R101 Airship was built, so it has the biggest airship sheds in the world – now film studios, used to make major

movies. We have the finest collection of vintage aircraft at Shuttleworth and many modern aircraft were developed at RAE Bedford. And during the war, the county was home to secret operations units doing all sorts of sneaky things!"

It was also, adds Arnold, the first part of the UK to become multicultural. "Thousands of Italians, then Asians, were brought over to work at the London Brick Company, and were integrated into Bedfordshire culture."

Local-born B&B owner David Blakeman appreciates this legacy. "Bedford has that rare thing in the UK – decent Italian restaurants!" But he believes the county's Englishness is its main appeal. "Its identity as a fertile agricultural area has been somewhat lost," he says. "But the villages often have attractive churches and half-timbered buildings. It's a gentle prettiness, incapable of rivalling Northumberland or Cornwall – but it's quintessentially English."

Blakeman retired here after buying 14th-century Harlington Manor – "a bit of a dream home, relatively competitively priced" – and opening it as a B&B. The manor sits on the edge of the Chilterns AONB, with National Trust land all around. Bunyan was once interrogated in its wood-panelled parlour where guests now tuck into excellent breakfasts. In the 1670s King Charles II stayed upstairs; the room still retains its period

style, festooned in crimson damask. It's one of the best (and best value) B&Bs I've stayed in, picked for its convenient location – midway between my parents and me – but turning out to be quite the destination. A bit like Bedfordshire itself.

At the end of the day, even if outsiders aren't kind to Bedfordshire, the county is kind to others. In another poll, this time by JustGiving, Bedford was named the most generous town for charitable donations. This is exemplified by its newest celebrity: Captain Tom Moore, who raised millions walking laps of his garden in Bedfordshire's Marston Moreteyne. "Captain Tom proved exactly what Bedfordshire and its people stand for," says Susan Lousada, incumbent High Sheriff of Bedfordshire. "Bedfordshire lies centrally, conveniently close to London, but mainly it's a lovely place to live."

RAF Edlesborough (Ex Dagnall) Some Background History

Prior to WWII the powerful transmitter stations in use by May 1939 were WT stations at Leighton Buzzard Dunstable. Control of the Dunstable transmitters was required at the Leighton buzzard control centre to serve HO Bomber Command and HO Coastal command communications. This was achieved by hiring remote control lines from the GPO. Leighton buzzard was the central control point and it

was from here the traffic channels would be switched to control the transmitter or transmitters as required via a switchboard at Leighton Buzzard.

The limitations at the Dunstable transmitter site caused a search to be made for a new site and Dagnall was found to be an ideal location. Treasury approval for acquiring the land was obtained and tests on the site began in June 1937. Early plans for the new transmitting station at Dagnall were based on the simple reprovision of the existing services, but in 1937 the scheme had to be very considerably extended.

In addition to the commitments arising from the expansion, RAF experience during the Abyssinian campaign when operational messages were taking as much as five days to handle, had underlined the need for high speed transmitters on certain routes. Revised estimates for the wireless telegraphy building and masts, for roads, water, drainage and electrical services and the barracks, quarters, accommodation and stores were approved by the treasury in April 1938. Work started on erecting 6 x 120 foot, 7 x 180 foot, and 5 x 230 foot masts and the transmitters installed included the SWB8B, SWB11 and the M15 besides the lower power T1087 and T77, together with various amplifiers. It had been anticipated that the more concentrated radiation arising from

the greater length materials possible that Dagnall would overcome any interference, but the trials proved that to overcome intentional jamming and to ensure clear and continued reception by stations abroad it was necessary to increase the strength of the transmitters. So a three phase 40KW amplifier was provided to boost the power of any transmitter who signals were affected thus increasing the overall power requirements. In order to meet commitments in the post European war period, and to provide increased power on existing circuits a number of high powered transmitters and amplifiers were provisioned in 1944. Accommodation for these additional transmitters had to be found and it was decided that this could best be found by altering existing accommodation at Dagnall and providing additional accommodation and Greatworth. These two stations were expected to remain the main transmitting stations as a long- term policy (which was in fact what happened). The target date for the completion of the Works Services and the installation of some 40 additional transmitters was February 1945.

To satisfy post-war long distance communications requirements tentative plans were drawn up in July 1945. Inter-command communications would be provided by the main signal centre at Leighton buzzard (which later became RAF Stanbridge), with receiving stations at Stoke Hammond and Chicksands (Chicksands was later replaced by RAF Bampton Castle near RAF Brize Norton in Oxfordshire). The main transmitting stations would then be at Greatworth and Dagnall (soon to be renamed RAF Edlesborough) and by August 1945 the majority of the actions required had it being taken. Dagnall was eventually to house some 12 x SWB8, 6 of which would drive SWB10 amplifiers, 5 x SWB11 and a small number of RCA transmitters of varying power. Greatworth was to have 17 x SW8, four of which would drive SWB10 amplifiers, 13 x SWB11 and a small number of RCA type ET 4332 transmitters.

What to Do in the Garden in July

July can be a busy time in the garden and time may determine what gets done. The garden is in full swing, and many gardens are at their peak in July and the veg plot is full of produce; and the weeds are growing as quickly as everything else.

At their best in July are Delphiniums, Agapanthus, Lavender, various Clematis, Achillea, Dahlias, Nepeta, Thalictrum late flowering Peonies, Day Lily, Roses, Sweet peas, Honeysuckle; it's all blooming and the garden is full of beautiful scents.

One of the main gardening tasks in July is dead heading the various flowering plants. For most plants this just means snipping off the spent flowers but for some plants it's a little different. Also, it is important not to dead head any plant which you want to display berries or hips later in the year, such as Rosa rugosa or Honeysuckle.

Keep on deadheading

Time is well spent dead heading. To keep summer plants and bedding at its best and to prolong flowering, it is essential to dead head. The purpose of dead heading is to encourage more flowering. Once the plant has flowered and set seed, so it can reproduce, plants are often reluctant to flower again, or continuously. Dead heading, which is cutting off the spent flower head, forces the plant back into the cycle to produce flower and seeds again. Some plants need a lot of attention and constant dead heading.

With some plants they need so much dead heading, it can be easier to take the shears to the top growth and very often a second growth and flush will follow, as with Alchemilla mollis, common name Lady's Mantle and hardy geraniums (not Pelargoniums) Chives and Nepeta can also be cut back.

How to dead head roses

In July, Roses are looking at their best and it is just as important to keep dead heading to get as many blooms as possible. With Roses when you dead head, it is best to snap off, not prune away, the spent flower and it will break just below the flower bud. An equally well respected way to dead head roses is to prune back from the dead flower to the next leaf joint.

How to dead head Delphinium, Foxgloves and Verbascum

When the flower spike has faded and gone over, cut it back by removing the flower head only, as in just the flower spike, not the whole stem and where there are side shoots surround the flower head, these may produce a second flush.

What are rose suckers

Suckers can be a real problem with Roses, and arise from how Roses are cultivated which is a form of grafting. A sucker is unwanted growth from the root stock and it is often vigorous growth and can over-take the Rose. The sucker foliage is a lighter in colour, the leaves are similar but a different shape and it is much more vigorous. If you have a rose bush which is showing one or two shoots which are growing much more strongly examine it to check it is not a sucker.

Suckers really do sucker the life out of the rose and need to be removed. Using thick gloves go to the base of the plant where the sucker is exiting the soil, scrape away the soil and if the sucker is not too established it should be possible to pull it away

below the rose graft at the base. It is best not to prune it away if you can help it, but if the sucker is well established, it maybe impossible to pull away the sucker without damaging the plant in which case you will have to prune it away.

Cut back early perennials

Early flowering perennials can begin to look a bit tired by July and their foliage is becoming tatty and brown. If these plants are cut back now, many will produce fresh green growth to liven up the border and sometimes even a second flush of flowers. Good candidates for this treatment are Oriental poppies, Alchemilla mollis, hardy Geraniums, Nepeta. Cut back close to the ground, feed and wait a couple of weeks. It can look a bit bare when you first to this and if you don't like the sight of too much earth, cut back just before you go on holiday. It seems a bit drastic to razor over Alchemilla mollis, but in a couple of weeks time you will be rewarded with a fresh green mound of new leaves.

Summer Prune Wisteria



July or early August is the time to prune Wisteria for the second time in the year. Twice yearly pruning is essential to keep Wisteria flowering each year. If you grow Wisteria, prune now otherwise you may jeopardise next year's flowers. To maintain a flowering Wisteria it is essential it is pruned in July/August and Jan/February, which makes it time consuming to grow as Wisteria can get very large requiring ladders to get to the upper reaches of the plant for pruning. Prune back the whippy summer growth to contain the plant. Wisteria

is vigorous and needs harsh treatment. Cut the whippy tendrils which have grown over summer back to about 15cm (6") long. If the main stems are growing out of their allotted space, cut back now to restrict the plant. This is a good time to feed Wisteria and Tomato feed is suitable.

Tips on growing Sweet peas

Sweet peas are lovely but at this time of year to keep them at their best Sweet peas need regular attention. To keep Sweet Peas flowering it is essential to pick, pick and pick the flowers. Don't worry that by doing this you will remove all the flowers; it has the opposite effect of making the plant produce more and more flowers. If any flowers have gone over and left a seed head behind, remove it. By doing this you will keep the plant flowering and in a good summer the last of the Sweet Peas can be picked in October.

Sweet Peas look best in vases if they have straight stems and to get those lovely straight stems you need to remove the thin tendrils which the plant produces which they use to cling onto the support. If the tendrils are left on the plant the tendrils twine around other parts of the sweet pea plant stopping its growth, and pulling bits of the plants down causing it to become tangled. The plant becomes a tangled mess and this prevents the flowers having those lovely straight stems which look so lovely when displayed as cut flowers.

Take Clematis cuttings

If you want to try your hand at propagating Clematis July is a good time. Cut off a

length of new growth maybe 500 cms and then snip it into bits each about 8-10cms with a pair of leaves. It is important to have the node (knobbly bit on the cutting) in the middle of the stem that you are going to use. Discard the very top of the cutting which will be too soft. Fill a pot with seed compost, make a few holes and tuck the cutting in with hormone rooting powder if you have it but by no means essential. The trick and why it works sometimes and not others, is the cutting must not dry out, but not too wet or it will damp/rot off. Try placing in propagator or put a poly bag over the pot and seal tightly with elastic band or string and ensure place warm but out of sunlight. Check weekly for signs of growth, and to ensure its not dried out when water gently.

Glis Glis - Edible Dormouse



In appearance, the glis glis is like a small version of the grey squirrel. The head and body are about 150mm (6") long and the bushy tail is about 125mm (5") long. The fur is silvery grey, shading to a light colour underneath and there is a ring of black hair around each eye.

The animal is common in Europe, but is not native to Britain. It was deliberately introduced into Tring Park in 1902 and has spread into the

surrounding area. The extent of the spread is not fully known, but is thought to be no more than about a 30 mile circle from Tring, although there have been unconfirmed reports of sightings at much greater distances. Today, the introduction of new, wild, species is prohibited by environmental laws, but at that time no one had any concern for the long term implications of releasing what is, in effect, a pest into the UK. Glis Glis cause considerable damage to trees and crops, and from the mid 1920's onwards were causing damage in houses, particularly by gnawing woodwork and electric cables.

The common name "edible dormouse" dates from Roman times. The Romans farmed them by keeping them confined and fed a diet to encourage them to become fat. They were then served as an exotic delicacy at banquets. Like many small animals, Glis Glis can appear to be attractive and entertaining. However, they are definitely not to be regarded as a pet or a cuddly toy. They have been described as sulky, standoffish and at times bad tempered. Once fully emerged from hibernation they are very nimble and fast on their feet.

Glis Glis are nocturnal and in houses the first signs of infestation will either be noises heard in the loft at night, or signs of damage in the loft or outbuildings. The animals hibernate for long periods (the German common name for them is "Seven months" because they hibernate for the 7 months October - April) Only limited research has been done on the



life cycle of the UK population. It is thought that Glis Glis emerge from hibernation in May and that a litter of 2 - 5 young are produced in July - August. It is possible that there may be more than one litter each year, but precise information is lacking. By the standards of small rodents, Glis Glis have fairly long lives. It is known that animals in the wild live for 3 - 5 years and there is a record of a Glis Glis in captivity surviving for 8 years. They are rarely found outside the Luton, Beaconsfield and Aylesbury triangle, where they are fairly common.

The small litter size and the small number of litters per year, together with action of natural predators mean that Glis Glis do not multiply out of control the way that rats and mice do. However, they are slowly extending the infested area and this will be aided if there is a tendency to warmer spring and summer weather.

As Glis Glis are regarded as pests, it is illegal for householders to release them back into the wild.

There are very strict laws about how Glis Glis must be caught and dispatched, everyone involved must work under strict Government license terms. Do not be tempted to control Glis Glis without recourse to a licence or a company working under such licence terms. Otherwise you may commit a criminal offence.

Please note that the terms of the licence is to kill the animals caught by specific means it is illegal to remove them and release them alive in another area. It is thought that some of the spread of Glis Glis to other areas has been caused by well-meaning householders

who have trapped Glis Glis and then, out of a mistaken sense of humane disposal have released them. Not only is this illegal but all this does is present the problem to someone else.




Photography in Focus

John Hockey shares some tips

In this short series, I will attempt to share some tips which may make your photographs more interesting, fun and pleasing to the eye.

I intend to cover some of the topics shown below:



I am just an amateur photographer and I don't have any special equipment. Some of what I have learned is to do with creativity and some to do with basic 'rules' that seem to give a good result – though as we all know, rules are meant to be if not broken at least bent a little!

Most of us can and do take pictures - maybe on our phone, tablet or with a traditional camera and it really doesn't matter too much how sophisticated your equipment is. I once went to a brilliant presentation by a professional nature photographer and at the end someone asked him "What camera do you have?" His answer has stayed with me – he said "That is like going to your friend for a meal and saying, 'That meal was lovely – what cooker do you have?" It is so much more about the ingredients and

how you put them together, so maybe this 'photographic cookbook' will help!

LIGHT

The worst time to take a photograph is arguably when most people do – in the middle of the day. The best is probably early morning or evening time. Even so, sometimes the light can be attractive when it comes from the side. Here is an example of a garden in the Cotswolds (Bourton House) and the topiary is so



much more interesting when the picture has raking light because it makes the shadows much more intense.

Similarly, they say you should never take a photograph into the sun, but if you have the light source behind say the trunk of a tree, you can still get an interesting effect. This is the 8th hole at Whipsnade Park Golf Course.

You do not have to stray far from home to get interesting effects

et between you and the light source. This is a patch of

with light, interspersing an object between you and the light source. This is a patch of rhubarb on our allotment on the green, Edlesborough. OK, I did have to get down on the ground to get it, but I think the result is so much more interesting than a straight shot of a rhubarb leaf from above:



As I said, one of the best times to make good use of light can be in the evening and I was lucky enough to be moored up opposite the Parliament Building in Budapest a few years ago. We were at dinner, when they suddenly put the lights on the building, illuminating the lovely limestone façade of this impressive structure.

There was nothing else for it, I had to excuse myself from dinner, grab my camera

and take the photograph – before dinner it was too bright, after dinner it would have been too dark. Sometimes you have to put yourself out a little to get a good shot and I hope you will agree it was worth it:

LOCAL HERALDRY

In this series, we take a look around local towns and villages to find interesting and unusual heraldry.

BACK TO BASICS 2



Continuing to look at the full heraldic achievement for William, 1st Duke of Bedford, we now turn to the other important components, which are underlined:

On a wreath of the colours, a goat statant Argent armed, unguled and tufted Or Crest:

A wreath or *torse* is a plait of (typically) two strands, interwoven to show the Meaning: main metal and colour(s) used in the shield (here Argent and Gules). It rests on

top of the helm, often securing the *mantling* in place (see below)

A goat *statant* is one simply standing on all fours

Armed means in this case the horns, Unguled means the hooves and Tufted refers to the 'beard'. They are all 'Or' or gold, always shown printed yellow

N.B. the crest is the device that sits on a wreath above the helmet. You should never refer to the whole shield or achievement as 'a family crest', this is quite wrong!

Mantling: Gules and Argent

Meaning: Mantling refers to the fabric waving about behind the helmet (sometimes irreverently called seaweed!) and the main colour and metal are described,

sometimes blazoned (e.g.) Gules doubled Argent

Supporters: Dexter, a lion rampant Gules gorged with a collar Argent charged with three escallops Sable

Sinister, a goat salient Argent armed, unguled and tufted Or

gorged simply means a collar. Meaning:

Salient means similar to rampant but with both back feet on the ground, rather

than just one.

The grass that the supporters are standing on is termed a *compartment*

Motto: Che Sara Sara

Often (if used) a scroll upon which is written a saying chosen by the family – in Meaning:

this case it means 'What will be will be'

A motto is not included in the Grant of Arms given by the College of Arms, but is often used by family members to indicate some key maxim or family quality

they are happy to subscribe to.

This concludes the look at some specific terms associated with coats of arms.

Otters: Watch Your Ponds!

An otter can be recognised by it's brown fur, often pale on underside; long slender body; small ears; long thick tail; webbed feet; swims very low in the water, head and back barely showing. They can live to be up to ten years old, though few survive more than five years.

The otter is a secretive semi-aquatic species which was once widespread in Britain. By the 1970s, otters were restricted mainly to Scotland, especially the islands and the north-west coast, western Wales, parts of East Anglia

and the West Country (though they remained common and widespread also in Ireland). This decline was caused by organo-chlorine pesticides. Since these were withdrawn from use, otters have been spreading back into many areas, especially in northern and western England.

Otters can travel over large areas. Some are known to use 20 kilometres or more of river habitat. Otters deposit faeces (known as spraints, with a characteristic sweet musky odour) in prominent places around their ranges. These serve to mark an otter's range, defending its territory but also helping neighbours keep in social contact with one another. Females with cubs reduce sprainting to avoid detection.

They feed on fish, especially eels and salmonids are eaten, and crayfish at certain times of the year. Coastal otters in Shetland eat bottom-living species such as eelpout, rockling and butterfish. Otters occasionally take water birds such as coots, moorhens and ducks. In the spring, frogs are an important food item.

In England and Wales otter cubs, usually in litters of two or three, can be born at any time of the

year. In Shetland and North-west Scotland most births occur in summer. Cubs are normally born in dens, called holts, which can be in a tree root system, a hole in a bank or under a pile of rocks. About 10 weeks elapse before cubs venture out of the holt with their mother, who raises the cubs without help from the male.

Otters are strictly protected by the Wildlife and Countryside Act (1981) and cannot be killed, kept or sold (even stuffed specimens) except under licence. In the late 1950s and early 1960s otters underwent a sudden and catastrophic decline throughout much of Britain and Europe. The cause was probably the combined effects of pollution and habitat destruction,

particularly the drainage of wet areas. Otters require clean rivers with an abundant, varied supply of food and plenty of bank-side vegetation offering secluded sites for their holts. Riversides often lack the appropriate cover for otters to lie up during the day. Such areas can be made more attractive to otters by establishing "otter havens", where river banks are planted-up and kept free from human disturbance. Marshes may also be very important habitat, for raising young and as a source of frogs.

While otters completely disappeared from the rivers of most of central and southern England in just 50 years, their future now looks much brighter. There is evidence that in certain parts of the UK the otter is extending its range and may be increasing locally. Otter populations in England are very fragmented and

the animals breed only slowly. Attempts have been made to reintroduce otters to their former haunts, by reintroducing captive bred and rehabilitated animals, with some attempts proving very successful.

Councillors Now Have Extra Cash to Help their Communities

Councillors at Central Bedfordshire Council are to be given extra funding so that they help local groups in their area affected by the impact of COVID-19.

Each year, as part of the Ward Councillor Grant Scheme, Councillors are given £2000 which they can allocate to groups in their area which aim to improve the lives of local people.

At a meeting on Tuesday 16 June the Council's Executive agreed a proposal to extend the existing Ward Councillor Grant Scheme and allocate an additional £1000 to each Ward Councillor. This is to enable them to support local groups that are dealing with the direct consequences of the current public health emergency. Unlike the existing scheme, bids for the additional funds do not require match funding.

Executive Member with responsibility for Communities, Cllr Tracey Stock explains: "Many local voluntary and community groups, both new and well established, have stepped up to help as part

of their response to the pandemic, playing a phenomenal role in their parishes, villages and towns. This will undoubtedly have put pressure on their resources which is why we want to help them.

"Local councillors know their area best and are well placed to spend the money where it will make the most difference.

"For some groups a small grant can make a big difference to how they make it through this pandemic."

Help keep our pathways clear across Central Bedfordshire

We must all continue to control the spread of coronavirus by washing our hands, wearing masks on public transport, and of course, observing social distancing.

The easing of the lockdown restrictions continues but the need to maintain social distancing presents challenges. Central Bedfordshire Council have been working with schools to re-open safely, preparing for non-essential shops to re-open, and keeping pathways clear to help provide more space, to ensure a 2-metre distance, where possible.

To help with this the council has been placing social distancing signs in town centres and outside schools, removing excess street furniture including bollards, bins and benches and cutting back vegetation to make pathways wider and clear of any obstructions. If residents see somewhere on the public highway that needs some urgent attention they can report it by emailing traffic. consultation@centralbedfordshire.gov.uk.

Residents can help too, by removing bins from outside their property as soon as possible after they have been emptied. By cutting back any bushes or hedges on their property growing over public pathways and to always park their vehicle considerately.

There are likely to be areas where it may be difficult for residents to pass each other or queue taking account of social distancing, local authorities have been given emergency powers to help address this. These powers mean that the council can make changes to the highway or a public space to support local businesses to open and to protect customer safety.

An example of this has been established in Leighton Buzzard High Street, where a temporary closure has been put in place to pedestrianise the High Street to aid social distancing and safety. The council will be monitoring social distancing in town centres over the next few weeks to see if changes are needed elsewhere.

Councillor Ian Dalgamo, Central Bedfordshire Council Executive Member for Community

Services, said: "We are doing everything we can to support our residents to social distance and ensure they can move around safely.

"We would like encourage the public to help with this by making sure our pavements are fully usable. This could mean cutting back overhanging vegetation, avoiding inconsiderate parking and keeping bins off the footpaths as soon as possible after being emptied. We would like to remind residents to check for any active birds' nests before undertaking any bush or hedge trimming."

"We are already seeing a lot of residents being considerate and helping to achieve this goal, but there is more that we can all do to continue to keep ourselves and others safe."







"We've been overawed by the loyalty and support shown to us during lockdown, and we ask that



Weather Conditions for May 2020






May started off with sunshine and light showers. But, by the 4th, we were into dry weather as high pressure arrived and the temperature rose. This lasted until the 9th when, by 6am, it had dropped to -1.7°c, which is very unusual for May and caused much damage to plants in the garden. We often get frost in May – when the temperature drops as dawn breaks – but this was unusual because it was cold enough for frost at midnight and didn't warm up until 7.30am. The month continued to be cool until the 15th when hot conditions zoomed in and the themometer hit 27.7°c on the 20th. It stayed extra warm and sunny until the end of the month.

May certainly experienced some extremes of temperatures, but perhaps the most notable aspect was how dry it was. We only had 3.4mm (1/sinch) of rain, which is 5% of the May average for the last twelve years. Even then, it was so hot that all of the moisture evapourated. Our wettest day was the 1st of May with only 2mm. All of which made for an exciting month for weather watchers like me.
